

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Abstract: This paper presents a review and assessment of existing theoretical accounts to explain differentials in access to post-compulsory education and training in advanced economies. The theories presented focus on the influence of a set of economic, sociological and political variables on access to education and they are criticised on two grounds. First, they seldom take into consideration the crucial role of politicalinstitutional factors, and in particular, welfare states' actions through direct investment and regulation in shaping access levels. Second, they do not reflect the current policy emphasis on lifelong-learning. The paper finishes with an outline of a future research agenda to address these gaps, and also calls for a more rigorous analysis of the weight of the different factors affecting access.
